# MAPLE LANE FARM

#### Maple Lane Farm -1949- and still going - by Ethel Keuhl

Maple Lane Farm under present ownership has experienced 61 years of agriculture. Eldon and Ethel Keuhl purchased the farm from Emett Drefke, a lumber dealer from Eganville, who had bought the farm from John McMunn in 1946. John and Susan then bought the Herb Hamilton Farm, later owned by Carl and Donna Cuddy and now by Wade and Ann Schroeder.

For years the Keuhl Farm was known as the McMunn Farm (and for good reason). John's father, William McMunn came up from Pakenham in the 1870's and claimed the land. Some years later, according to reports, he returned in a buggy and a simple horse and an axe to clear the land and build those stone fences that were "Man's testimony to hard work". He built a log house and in 1905 he married Miss Ida Sweeney, a local girl who had taught school for 3 years at \$200 per year.

Three daughters and two sons completed the McMunn family. The present house was built in 1919 or 1920, the year the father died and the youngest daughter was born. Remnants of the early log house were recovered in the garden in the form of square nails.

When the Keuhls came in July of 1949, there was no telephone or hydro on the Marsh Road. By the time their son Murray was six months old, the hydro came in December of 1951. Dwight was born 12 months after Murray. We decided we really needed a washing machine from Simpsons and it came with 14 small boxes of OXYDOL – Oh GLORY! How things change... from horses and axes to chain saws and tractors and TVs and computers.
